The security thread/window thread (1 thread) is partially visible and is seen as shiny metal fields. The thread becomes an unbroken band when the banknote is held against the light.



The 1000-krone banknote is the only banknote in the series that will be withdrawn from circulation after 31 May 2025.

Watermark Visible on the left-hand side when the banknote is held up to the light. The watermark shows a Viking Ship from Skuldelev in Roskilde Fjord, together with the denomination.

Window thread and security thread The window thread on the reverse is woven into the paper and features moving waves when the banknote is tilted back and forth. A security thread is embedded in the right-hand side of the paper and can be seen when the banknote is held up to the light or illuminated.

UV fibres

Under ultraviolet light, the Sun Chariot can be seen in a large version under the bridge motif. Yellow circles and background patterns can also be seen under the motifs on the obverse and reverse.

Hologram The hologram shows the archaeological find the Sun Chariot. The sun dial on the chariot is in gold print, and the horse is seen in relief. When the banknote is moved up and down, the lines around the Sun Chariot appear in different colours.

Tactile copper print The bridge and the text "1000 ET TUSINDE KRONER" are reproduced in copper print. The colour is like a thick layer on top of the paper and can be felt with your fingers.

Microtext Can barely be read with the naked eye. On the bridge it says, for example "Storebæltsforbindelsen forbinder Sjælland med Fyn. Østbroen åbnede i 1998 og er 6.790 meter lang".

Micro artwork With a magnifying glass it is possible to see a fine intricate pattern and the number 1000 on the obverse and reverse of the banknote.
